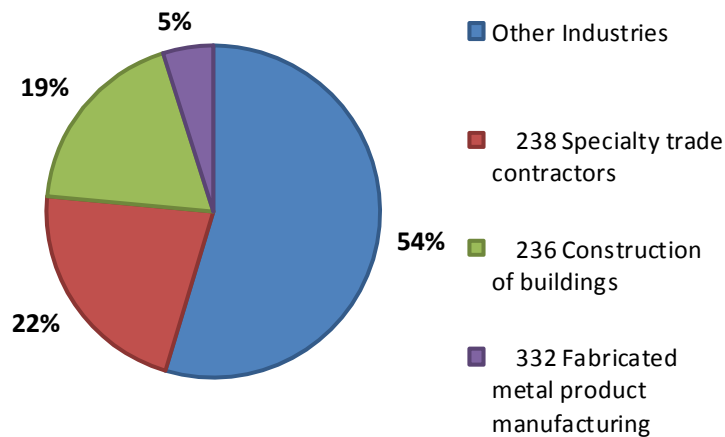


Sector Description

Trades workers in this sector are primarily engaged in employment where materials are transformed in the production of goods. This may relate to manufacturing activity for goods for final consumption such as kitchen cabinets, or it could relate to activities in intermediate steps in the manufacturing process, such as the work performed by a welder, mechanic, or an electrician.

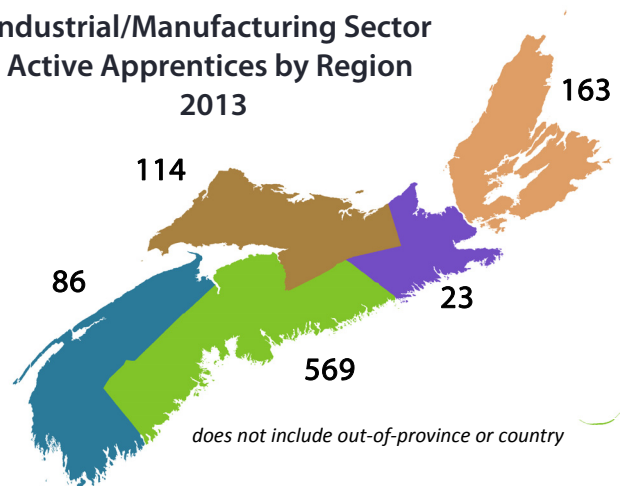

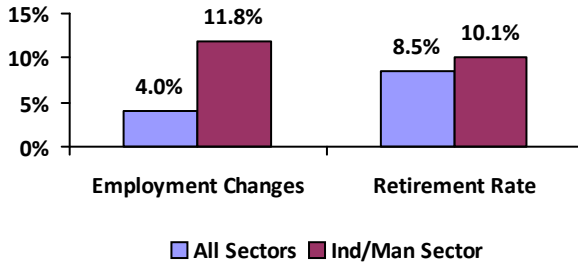
Industrial/Manufacturing Sector Active Apprentices by Region 2013

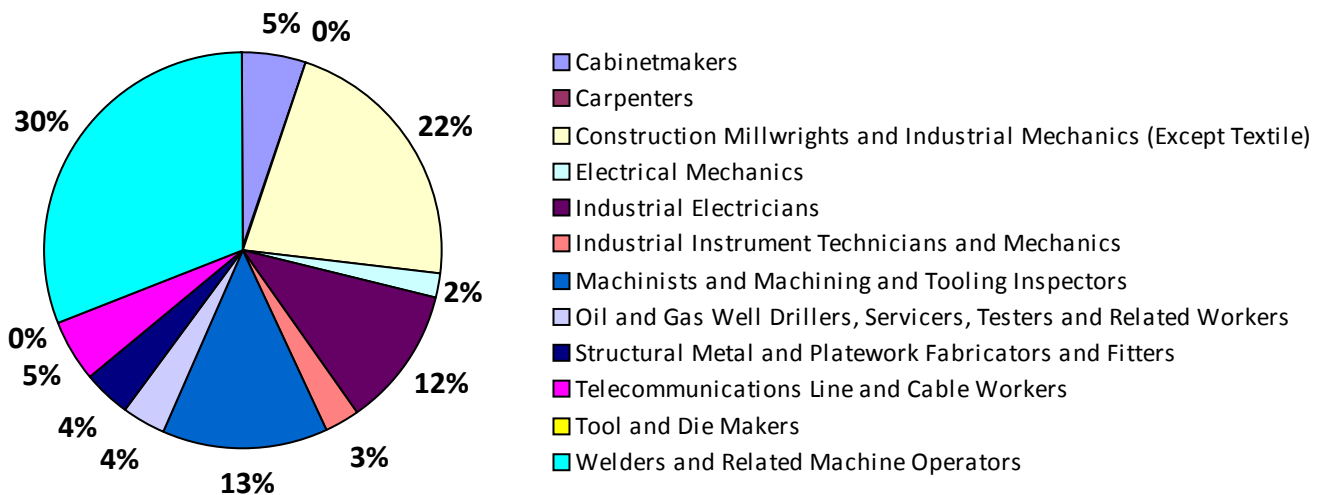

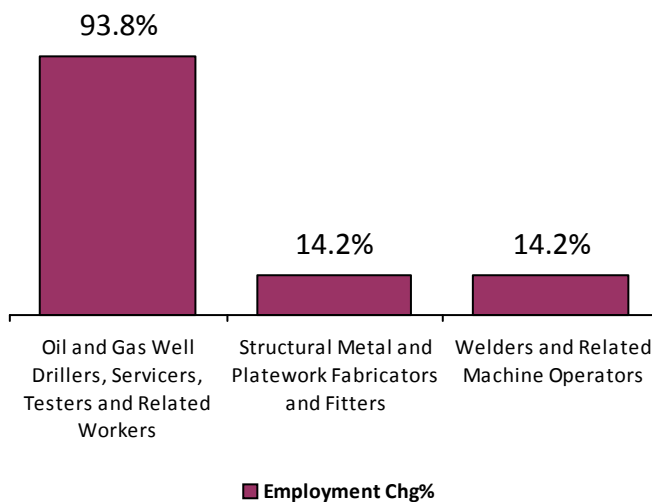
